Terry Brewick, D.D.S., believes in staying current.

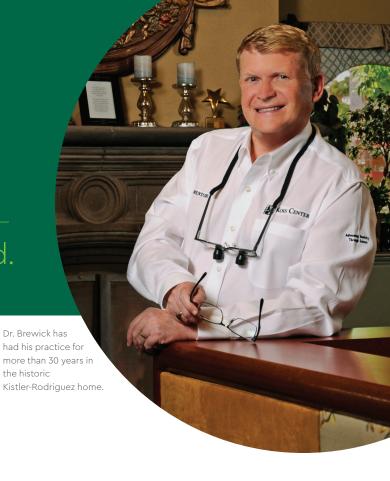
